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## 27<sup>th</sup> Annual Regional Ocean Sciences Bowl Attracts Competing High School Science Students from Across Virginia

On Friday, February 28<sup>th</sup> and Saturday, March 1<sup>st</sup>, top science students from 13 Virginia high schools faced off virtually for the **27<sup>th</sup> Annual Blue Crab Bowl**. The **Blue Crab Bowl is the Virginia regional competition of the National Ocean Science Bowl (NOSB<sup>®</sup>).** Fifteen teams came from schools across the Commonwealth, from Manassas and Charlottesville to Hampton Roads and the Eastern Shore. The 80 students spent the two days in heated competition focused on marine science.

The challenging 2-day event included both round-robin and finals contests. Tense final rounds resolved 1<sup>st</sup> – 4<sup>th</sup> place winners. First Place was captured by Warwick High School in Newport News. In Second Place was Seton School from Manassas. Third Place honors were earned by The Governor's School for Science and Technology from Hampton. Fourth Place honors went to Catholic High School – B Team, from Virginia Beach.

The **Blue Crab Bowl** is a cooperative effort between Old Dominion University's Department of Ocean and Earth Sciences and the Virginia Institute of Marine Science, William and Mary. Over eighty volunteers, including science faculty, undergraduate and graduate students, and staff from both institutions, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and other organizations, donated many hours of their time to ensure the success of this exciting event. Virginia's Blue Crab Bowl was among the inaugural NOSB competitions in 1998. Designed to inspire and challenge high school students, NOSB contests like the Blue Crab Bowl test the competitors' knowledge of the marine sciences, covering the breadth of oceanography and maritime disciplines. **To date, in its 27-year history, the Blue Crab Bowl has involved over 2,000 of the Commonwealth's brightest science students from over 60 public and private schools across Virginia.** 

Using questions designed by marine scientists and educators, the contest tested students' knowledge of oceanography, geology, biology, maritime history and policy. Guided by their teacher coaches, students broadened their awareness and understanding of the oceans as they prepared for the competition. The Bowl provides a forum for students who excel in math and science to receive regional and national recognition for their diligence and talent.

Awards – including custom-made "crab bowl" trophies and mugs, designed by Amy Lee of Amy Lee Pottery in Norfolk were presented to the top four teams. All students received prizes and coaches received science teaching resources and memberships in the Mid-Atlantic Marine Education Association.

Through over 20 regional competitions across the nation, NOSB provides an educational forum intended to: generate student interest in the ocean sciences; improve awareness of our oceans, coasts and Great Lakes; and create an "ocean literate" society that can meet the ocean challenges of the future.
